



The [Economic and Social Research Council](http://www.esrc.ac.uk) is the UK's largest funding agency for research and postgraduate training relating to social and economic issues.

The University of Leeds is part of the ESRC White Rose Doctoral Training Partnership (WRDTP), forming a collaboration between the Universities of Leeds, Sheffield, York, Bradford, Sheffield Hallam, Hull and Manchester Metropolitan and through this is able to offer a range of ESRC Postgraduate Studentships. These studentships are available in named Thematic Interdisciplinary Training Pathways on either a 1+3 or +3 basis, depending on the level of research training already achieved.

1+3 Studentships – an integrated Research Training Masters – MA Social Research (Interdisciplinary) - (delivering the majority of the core social sciences research methods training requirements) followed by a 3-year PhD programme.

+3 Studentships – 3-year PhD (assumes that an applicant has already met the majority of the core social sciences research methods training requirements and that the PhD focus is largely on more advanced training.

Applicants applying for a +3 award must demonstrate that they have already completed the full social sciences research methods training requirements at Masters' level, ie to be eligible for a +3 award, the applicant must demonstrate that they have already completed substantial social sciences training in research methods which would enable them to undertake an independent research project in a particular discipline or interdisciplinary field. An applicant **MUST** have a minimum of 60 credits research methods social science training (not including the dissertation) at Masters level to be considered for a +3 studentship.

SCHOLARSHIP VALUE	
Academic Fees	The award will cover fees at standard Research Council rates. The School will pay any difference in fees, ensuring that your fees are met in full. Fees may rise during the course of your candidature: this will be by no more than the rate of inflation, calculated according to the Retail Price Index.
Maintenance	£14,777 in Session 2018/19 ⁺ for full-time study, part-time will be pro-rata. Advanced Quantitative Methods students receive an enhanced stipend of £3,000 per annum for full-time PhD study. UK applicants will be eligible for a full award (paying fees and maintenance at standard Research Council rates) if they meet the residency criteria. EU applicants are normally eligible for a fees only award, unless they have been resident in the UK for a full 3 years immediately preceding the start date of the award. ⁺ amount increases per annum in line with the Research Council UK rate which is announced on https://www.ukri.org/skills/funding-for-research-training/
Travel/ Research Costs	Research Training Support Grant available in the PhD part of the award – Variable amount depending on the scheme plus other allowances where applicable.
DURATION OF SCHOLARSHIP	
Full-time or part-time - 3* years in total for full-time; part-time 5** years in total (for a +3 studentship). *The award will be made for one year in the first instance and renewable for a further period of up to two years, subject to satisfactory academic progress; ** the award is tenable for 24 months (two calendar years) in the first instance and is renewable annually for a maximum period of five years subject to satisfactory academic progress.	
Eligibility Criteria – Please read this information carefully, as your application will be automatically rejected if you do not meet ALL of the criteria listed below	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Applicants applying on both a 1+3 and a +3 basis MUST in the first instance apply for a place on a research postgraduate programme and be in receipt of a Student ID Number¹ to be eligible for an ESRC White Rose DTP Studentship. Applications without a valid ID Number will be rejected. To apply for a place on a research postgraduate programme please visit http://www.leeds.ac.uk/info/130206/applying/91/applying_for_research_degrees; These awards are normally only available to nationals from the UK and EU and are not open to applicants who are liable to pay academic fees at the international fee rate². Applicants must hold a First Degree at undergraduate level equivalent to at least a UK Upper Second Class Honours degree or equivalent (a less than sufficient undergraduate degree may be enhanced, eg by a Master's degree). Applicants should either have graduated with the appropriate First Degree or be in their final year of study. Applicants whose first language is not English must meet the University's English Language requirements. Some Schools require a standard of English higher than the University minimum. You should have a valid test result, which is normally no more than two years old by your official start date at the University of Leeds. Examples of an acceptable English Language Standard can be found at: http://www.leeds.ac.uk/info/123100/admissions/143/entry_requirements Applicants applying for a +3 award must demonstrate that they have achieved a level of research training to allow them to proceed directly to PhD (usually through the attainment of a previous Master's qualification in the social sciences).

Applicants must live within a reasonable distance of the University of Leeds whilst in receipt of this Studentship. 	

¹ New research applicants automatically receive their Student ID Number by email. Applicants who already have a Student ID Number must ensure they apply for a research degree study place for Session 2019/20 as soon as possible.

² Advanced Quantitative Methods studentships are open to international applicants.

Selection of Award Holders

After a School selection process, applicants will be informed as to whether they are being nominated for an ESRC WRDTP Studentship. The White Rose Academic Quality Committee will review the nominations and decide on the final list of awards. The University will use the data provided in the application form for internal selection and statistical purposes and publish the names of the successful applicants within the University and externally on the University website. The final outcome is expected mid April 2019 for the Pathway/AQM Studentships and the end of April 2019 for Network and Collaborative Studentships.

How to Apply

Applicants applying on both a 1+3 and a +3 basis should first of all apply for the relevant research postgraduate programme, and once in receipt of a Student ID Number, should then complete the research online application form available at:

It is important that you select the correct studentship type for which you wish to apply, as this will determine the fields you will be asked to complete.

After receipt of your studentship application, the relevant School will provide further advice on your suitability for either a 1+3 or +3 studentship and advise whether you are required to apply for a Masters study place for the MA Social Research (Interdisciplinary) programme. **Please be aware that you may be required to provide 2 academic references to the relevant School in support of your studentship application.**

Please note that, due to the large volume of applications, the Postgraduate Scholarships Office will not enter into any correspondence regarding the progress of an application until the outcome is known.

We welcome scholarship applications from all suitably-qualified candidates, but UK black and minority ethnic (BME) researchers are currently under-represented in our Postgraduate Research community, and we would therefore particularly encourage applications from UK BME candidates. All scholarships will be awarded on the basis of merit.
